Dear Friends of Madagascar Mission,

The year of 2014 was a year of challenges --- a year of growth --- a year

<u>of God Surprises!</u> We ended 2013 having met our financial commitments to mission and ministry in Madagascar. We were thankful and pleased! We give God thanks for providing us with faithful and generous donors who have provided the financial resources to make this all possible.

Two mission organizations asked FOMM to assume their projects in Madagascar: Renewal International and Sharing Hope International.

After much discussion and prayer, we assumed 4 new projects from them: 3 Bible Schools, support of Steve Lellelid, printing of the Bible into the Tandroy dialect (a recent translation done by Steve Lellelid),

and a S. W. Madagascar Drip Irrigation Project.

This purpose of this report is to share with our donors what we, together, have been able to accomplish in 2014. It is also intended to encourage you to continue your support, to invite others: family, friends and congregations to join us in this adventure of faithfulness to support God's Global Mission. Even though we met our goal in 2014, it does not mean that the work is completed. As page 12 of this report shows, we have much more that God is challenging us to do together.

Our guarantee to our donors is that 100% of your gift goes towards the mission project you choose to support! Thanks so very much!

Prison Ministry Program

TOTAL 2014 Financial Support: \$41,692.81

The Prison Ministry Program has had another fruitful year in providing spiritual care to the prisoners with their Biblical mandate from John 8:36: "If the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed..."

The program continues to provide worship services in six prisons, provide holy communion services once a month, baptize and confirm prisoners, distribute rice/dry beans, medications, Luther's Small Catechism, notebooks, pens and Bibles. In addition they have served special holiday meals.

In 2014, the Prison Ministry expanded from 6 to 7 prisons. The new addition was at the Fianarantsoa Prison. Pastor Theodoric and his wife Voaly who are studying at the Graduate School Seminary in Fianarantsoa under the support of FOMM are also coordinating and providing this new prison ministry.

Here is their description of what they are doing: "Greeting in the name of Jesus! Our work at the Fianarantsoa Prison is constantly increasing. Every Sunday at 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. we lead worship.

On the 1st and 3rd Sundays we also celebrate the Lord's Support.

On the second Sundays we share rice for all prisoners (about 700)

and on the fourth Sunday we celebrate what we call a Shepherd Service, which is a serve of confession and forgiveness with the

laying on of hands. Every Sunday we have 200 prisoners worship with us."

Ejeda Hospital

TOTAL 2014 Financial Support: \$8,400.00 (Additional Support for Medical Emergency \$3,425.00)

1. Introduction: Ejeda is in the remote S.W. part of Madagascar that is very poor. Its mission is to provide medical and nutrition care. We are very thankful for the support FOMM provides. It is indeed a gift of love to these people. (This report is provided by Dr. Elson and Hanitra, who manage the Ejeda Programs.)

2. Activity Report:

A. Ejeda Nutrition Program

In Africa, a patient's family must provide them food while in the hospital. In this arid area, families often suffer from not having enough food. How will a patient get well without adequate food? FOMM's Nutrition Program provides food for these patients. The family must prepare the food. Each needy patient receives:

<u>Tuberculosis patients:</u> 14 cups of rice and 7 packets of 15gm of milk powder per week

<u>Hospital Patients:</u> 4 cups of rice and two packets of 15gm of milk powder every other day.

Number of hospital patients served: 1,314
Number of T.B. patients and handicapped kids: 1,146
Number of malnourished patients: 19

B. Medical Emergency Fund

In 2014 FOMM donors contributed \$3,425.00 to this fund.
FOMM does not budget for this account but depends upon the generosity of donors to provide funds. These gifts provided medical care for 17 patients, with a small balance left for 2015.

Evangelists

- 1. Introduction: We are thankful to our Lord Jesus for giving us FOMM. Without their financial and prayer support the exciting news in this report would not be possible. We pray for your continuing support in 2015. (This report is provided by Dr. Elson and Hanitra, you manage the Evangelist and Ejeda Programs.)
- 2. Activity Report: FOMM supports 35 evangelists in 2 Synods of the Malagasy Lutheran Church, the Betioky and the Betroka Synods.

 We have been invited to support an additional 15 evangelists in the Ambovombe Androy Synod (See "2015 New Opportunities'", on page 12 of this Annual Report for further details.)

A. Betioky Synod

I Corinthians 12:6, "God works through different men in different ways, but it is the same God who achieves his purposes through them all." God is at work in the world, He wants us to fulfill his mission.

Looking back over 2014, we praise God for who He is, and we thank God for what He has done. The Lord is doing wonderful and powerful work through the evangelists that FOMM supports.

<u>In 2014 the 15 evangelists supported by FOMM have baptized</u> 538 children, 451 adults, and confirmed 658 persons.

The evangelists are working in 24 rural villages. The need is so great. The evangelists are challenged with so many needs. They have a very difficult task. Please pray for them.

A. Betroka Synod

The work in this Synod is very difficult. The evangelist must first teach the people how to read and write. This area is full of much robbery and idolatry. The power of evil is strong. As a result the people and evangelists are fearful to travel alone. The people try to find ways to hear the message of the Gospel from the evangelists to find peace and hope. Yet there is progress and success. 441 villages have been visited this year, 153 children and 42 adults have been baptized, 76 confirmed, and 1,229 children and 58 adults have learned to read and write.

Bible Schools

TOTAL 2014 Financial Support: \$8,000.00

(FOMM assumed support for the Bible Schools in the last quarter of 2014)

In the Malagasy Lutheran Church (FLM) there are three kinds of schools to train persons for service in ministry:

- <u>1)</u> Bible Schools: A student attends for 2 years. After graduation a student is assigned to a Synod. The Synod then selects a village where an evangelist will live among the people who have not heard the Gospel, and work to develop a community of believers.
- <u>2)</u> Regional Seminaries: There are 7 regional seminaries that offer a Bachelor's Degree for ordination to serve a congregation.
- 3) Graduate School Seminary: There is 1 seminary that offers a Bachelor of Divinity degree in theology for teaching.

Friends of Madagascar Mission supports 3 Bible Schools: Manasoa Fanjahira, Betroka and Manatantely Bible Schools.

Bible Schools

The buildings, housing and educational resources are very minimal, but the faculty and students are committed to serving their Lord and Savior by preparing to become an evangelist. Our calling is to support them with our prayers and our gifts to provide this Bible School training.

2015 Budget Support Needed: \$36,000.00

Friends of Madagascar Mission has assumed support of these Bible Schools because they are essential for the evangelical outreach of the Malagasy Lutheran Church. FOMM currently supports 35 evangelists who were educated at one of these Bible Schools. Our hope and prayer is that we will continue to support more evangelists as funds become available from FOMM's generous donors.



Missionary Steve Lellelid

"How then will they call on Him in whom they have not believed? How will they believe in Him whom they have not heard? (Romans 10:14)

Steve is supported by Friends of Madagascar Mission (FOMM) through the gifts from many donors. Steve works in the southern part of Madagascar in the Ambovombe-Androy Synod of the Malagasy Lutheran Church within the Evangelism Department.



For the past 14 years he has been working to translate the Bible into the dialect of the Tandroy people. The literacy rate is below 5%. So, if the Bible is being translated into their dialect, they also must be taught to read.

Even before Steve began to translate the Bible into the Tandroy dialect he began building a dictionary of Tandroy dialect words. Working with other organizations they created a literacy training programs to teach

people how to read. In the literacy programs they often used the portions of the Bible, Steve had already translated. Steve recalls how men and women were weeping when the heard the Word of God, which they had never heard before in their own dialect.

Steve says, "Often the temptation has arisen for me to hide in a quiet place to finish translating the Bible. But then I remind myself how foolish that would be; because it is living among the people, hearing the language spoken, that I am able to make the Word of God come alive for the Tandroy people."

Tandroy Bible Printing

TOTAL 2014 Financial Support: \$58,910.00

"Your Word is a lamp to my feet, and a light to my path."
(Psalm 119:105)

The process of translating the Bible into the Tandroy dialect was not only translating the words, it involved going out to the people to read it and listen and ask what words made sense to them in their dialect. The goal was to bring God's Word to them so they could hear it and believe in Jesus Christ!

Here's an account Steve tells about how the process worked: "It was not always working in the office. Often we'd take a portion of the Bible and go out into the villages to test it. I went to Behasy, no believers there. I rested my back against the house of the local witch-doctor who was lame from his own nefarious craft. I read a portion, stopped after each verse to make sure each understood and asked them to repeat what it meant. I would take notes of their responses: word order, change of vocabulary, words they didn't get, etc. I did this for 3 hours with a group of 20-30. When I was through, the witch-doctor squirmed to his doorway and asked to speak. After thanking me for taking the time to read Scripture to them, he offered land, any parcel we thought would work for a Church, if I wanted one. He was moved by God's Word and invited us to begin a congregation in his village."

<u>Such is the power of the Word of God.</u> It moves a person from doubt, disbelief to faith and love in action!

2015 Budget Support Needed: \$31,090.00

2015 New Opportunities

Friends of Madagascar Mission (FOMM) Board of Directors establishes a budget each year. This becomes our goal for raising funds for mission and ministry in Madagascar for the New Year. Each year of FOMM's existence we have met the goals set by the Board.

Also, each year, there are other projects which we are asked to support. The list is extensive, because the need is so great. The Board can not approve every request for funding that we receive, even though we would love to support all of these mission and ministry evangelism projects.

So, we are posting some of these projects that are not included in FOMM's budget, in hopes that a donor (congregation or individual/family) would want a special mission project to support in commemoration of an anniversary, in memory of, in honor of someone or just want to give to mission!

Below are three such projects;

1. 15 new evangelists for the Ambovombe – Androy Regional Synod The Synod is located at the southern tip of Madagascar. It is a large Synod geographically. They describe their evangelism goal in this way: "There will be no end to evangelical outreach until our Lord Jesus Christ appears in the heavens." In 2011 they had 433 baptisms, 427 in 2012 and 230 in 2013. The Norwegian Mission Society supported this work, but have terminated this program. FOMM has been asked to provide support for 15 evangelists or a total of \$9,000.00 a year.

2. Rural Church Building

We are waiting for the proposal for helping a Lutheran congregation in a rural region to build a church building. This would be a project for a congregation, an individual or a combination of both.

3. Satellite for better communication with our partners in rural areas
It is difficult to communicate with our partners in mission in Madagascar
because of poor or lacking email connections. This project would provide
quick communication.
